ANOTHER MILESTONE OCCASION

Reaching 70 years on 5 May is Centurion No 789 popular Olly Browne, who qualified in the 1985 BT 24 Hours race on Colchester Garrison Track when passing 100 miles in 23:05.49 in Ilford AC colours. It was an infamous race as wind blew away all our lap scoring charts. So proud was Olly, that he has 789 tattooed on an arm. Olly competed in more 100s, and joined a much-admired group of athletes who've bettered 24 hours on both roads and tracks. He also completed 2 individual 100 miles walks along Westcliff-on-Sea seafront raising considerable sums for "Help for Heroes" - with many Essex Walker readers showing up both times to join crowds cheering him on. In the 2009 Barclay Bi-Centenary 100 Miles at Newmarket's Rowlev Mile Racecourse. Olly broke a bone in a foot at around 20 miles - but pressed on in increasing pain to close home Ilford's winning RWA Long Distance Championship team trio behind Kevin Marshall and Micky Sutton. THEY HAVE NINE LIVES

A sad Facebook entry informs us that respected Centurion **John Cannell** (C388) has handed over his 2 beloved cats - Geronimo and Kojak - to Manx Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to be rehomed, as John's now too old to care for them. We hope they'll find good future owners and also John's health improves. In 1966 John, aged 20, qualified as a Centurion in the 1966 Leicester-to-Skegness Walk and completed a total of 5 UK 100 miles' walks, the last being the Arthur Eddlestone BEM Memorial Walk at a rainy Hendon Police College in 1989. Three of those 5 walks were in the 17 hours' time bracket, his fastest on Leicester's Congerstone course in 1988, clocking 17:10.15 when 2nd to Surrey's Richard Brown - who'd failed by a mere 35 seconds to join an exclusive club of race walkers to better 17 hours. At the '87 Ewhurst 100 Miles John broke the tape in 17:55.10. John was 15th in the 1970 Commonwealth Games 20 Miles in Edinburgh with 2:56.19 on the stopwatch. Isle of Man resident John who won six 85 Miles' Parish Walks, made many mainland appearances - including an Enfield League race at Donkey Lane. In September 2007 at our Race Walking Association's Centenary Dinner in the Piccadilly Royal Air Force Club, John had the kudos of being seated on the top table. We wish John, and his lovely pets, well in all that'll come their way.








THANKS TO OUR READERS

2024 WORLD ATHLETICS RACE WALKING TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Cameron Corbishley, the only UK walker to achieve the qualifying time for selection for the 2024 World Athletics race walking team championships, completed the 20 km race in Antalya, Turkey, in 45th place.





WALKERS AT THE TCS LONDON MARATHON

Benfleet-based Centurion Kim Howard clocked 5:44.13 in what was her 114th marathon completion - a wonderful achievement. One of her sons also excelled with a rapid 2:57 on the stopwatch. Verity Snook of Aldershot, Farnham & District AC crossed the line in 4:58.27.

Hilary McDermott's daughter Ellie was a competitor - Hilary writes:

"What a day ... it's much harder for the supporters than the runners ③ I walked far more than 26 miles tracking her ③ ⑤ Ellie did so well, her time was 6 hours 35 minutes. I have attached a photo of her. Interestingly, Dad (Lew Mockett - Ed) and I ran it 41 years ago together – when it was the Mars London Marathon."





NOTE: 2025 TCS London Marathon entries have now closed with a record number of over 840,000 applications received; applicants are to learn of their success (or otherwise) in a ballot during July.

If more finishers are known, please let Essex Walker know so we can give you a namecheck. We used to have many race walkers appearing in this event, but a much-reduced number reflects our discipline's numerical decline, and draws attention to a reduction of race walkers now keen on 26 miles.

BERT BAZZONI RIP

We've heard of Essex-based Bert's recent death. Nonagenarian Bert was a Royal Mail employee who for years supported annual Postmen-in-Uniform 6 Miles Walks around the streets starting and finishing near a then huge Mount Pleasant Sorting Office. The Post Office scene was thriving in past decades, which saw Bert appearing in such races at York on a regular basis. In our memorable

Essex League 300th race at Colchester on Bank Holiday Monday 31 August 1992, which saw 91 toe the line to be started by Chief Superintendent Mike Blackwall (Numero Uno in the town's Police) who'd competed in our first Essex League race. A Colchester High Street start in a then then town centre (it's now a City), Bert was 86th in 51.46 and one of **4** Bazzonis on our result sheet. 90 finished/1 retired over an odd distance of *5,828 metres* - that retiree was Reg Walton, ex-RAF man of the Joggers, who quit in protest at seeing some walkers "getting away with it" and he was never seen again. This race was of

unknown distance with a prize awarded to the competitor who'd guessed closest to the true distance completed - this won by Cath Duhig who'd finished 16th in 30.44. Up front it was headed by Stuart Phillips in 20.08 followed by Jamie O'Rawe, Roger Mills, Scott Davis, Carl Lawton, Geoff Hunwicks, Steve Uttley, John Llewellin, Roy Sheppard and Amos Seddon who respectively completed our top ten. Essex Radio Sports Reporter Roger Buxton covered this event with his opening words being. "44 yearold knock-kneed Sports Shop proprietor from Wanstead, Roger Mills, made yet another successful comeback". Injury put Roger's appearance in doubt as it had limited him to just 3 pre-race training sessions. But once the "off" was called he shot down Colchester High Street as though the Devil was after him and was a circuit-one leader. He came 3rd but reported by Tuesday he'd suffered as a result. Afterwards Colchester Joggers (as then called) made all welcome in their impressive HQ near the town's barracks. Jamie O'Rawe spent half-an-hour trying to find it before giving up and going home, while Michael Croft and Dave Sharpe pulled up outside an institutional looking building into which Sharpie ventured - to find it was an OAP home - on the day he was 1 year short of veteran status, so was let out. What a wonderful enjoyable day - the sort we used to so much enjoy. And many still own garments from that day as 300th commemorative t-shirts given to all, as supplied by "Athletic East" (prop Roger Mills), were of such quality many still have and train in them. They're still in shape and have hardly faded after decades of wear. We say farewell to participant Bert Bazzoni and express condolences to his family.

A MILESTONE OCCASION

Dorset-based much talented long distance superstar Sandra Brown celebrated a milestone birthday on Easter Monday - her 75th, so has now moved up to another athletics age group category. Said Sandra (C735), "Yes, a new age group! We've had a lovely day walking [what else] in the sunshine. I hope all's well, and all best wishes".

DAVID DELANEY RIP

It is sad to report the passing of David Delaney on 23 March. He was a member of London Vidarians and Surrey Walking Club and qualified as an Enfield Leaguer in the Surrey team that finished fourth in the 2013 Enfield Race Walking League series.

I first met David in 1960 at the AAA Junior championships at Hurlingham where he finished fifth in 7.44. It was a brief meeting because I was a northerner in those days and had to dash away to catch my train home. He was unfortunate in some ways to be around when the standard of the juniors of his time was extremely high with the likes of Peter Marlow, Shaun Lightman and John Paddick, who all went on to become Olympians.

Our trails didn't cross much over the years, but in his late 60's early 70's he became an Enfield regular between 2010 and 2013 completing at least two EO7's, a Moulton 5 and the "Friendship Walk" that celebrated the Olympic Games held in London. I found him a quiet, unassuming man and very supportive when he found out that I had been diagnosed with Atrial Fibrillation, a condition he also had. Most of David's performances at the time, with the exception of the 19.4 miles Guernsey Church's Walk, were up to 10km and averaging 7 min kms (11 min miles) which aptly demonstrated the reason why I should not be too downbeat about my situation.

DAVE DELANEY RIP

I was in the London Vidarians from 1968-to-1973 before moving to Ilford AC. Dave Delaney was a respected and prominent member of the Club. When I did a 38 miles' Hastings-to-Brighton classic (that year BBC2 did a half-hour documentary on the event), Dave ran a bed and breakfast establishment in Hastings. He put me up before the race and refused to accept any payment for so doing. I was in Guernsey for an annual Church-to-Church Walk when Dave was taken ill and needed hospital treatment. On completion he waved his EHIC form to settle the matter - only to be informed Guernsey wasn't in the EU. Among his memories of lovely Guernsey was also one of paying a hefty medical bill. One year a now defunct New Year's Day 10K at Victoria Park was cancelled owing to heavy snow. Somehow news never reached Dave, who was the only racewalker to show up. He declared he was

the New Year's Day Walk winner. After the late Paul Nihill moved to Kent he returned to Croydon from time-to-time for a reunion of old friends - and Dave always turned up.

His athletics talent was seen early as in 1960 at Hurlingham when 5th in the AAA Junior 1 Mile Championship clocking 7 minutes 44 seconds. The 4 in front of him all were future big-names: 1st Ron Wallwork (1966 Commonwealth Games Champion), 2nd Peter Marlow (1972 Olympian), 3rd/4th were future internationals Maurice Fullagher and Alex Banyard respectively. I last met Dave at the London Vidarians Centenary Dinner in the Piccadilly Royal Air Force Club.

NEWS OF STEVE WYNN

Now aged 77, long time former Romford (Collier Row) resident Steve, who now resides in Walworth, has retired from a job he'd done after retirement from Mount Pleasant Sorting Office. Steve was in our Essex League's 300th race finishing 36th in 34.23, one behind "character" John Perkins and one ahead of Centurion C946-to-be Glen Robertson in a close finish separated by seconds. Steve was a fast sprint walker with a number of Post Office-in-Uniform walk victories to his credit and a sub-10 hours Londonto-Brighton finish on his record. Steve lives close to former London Vidarian and Post Office walker Bill Muntzer. Steve's home is only 5 bus stops away from "The New Den", where he's a lifelong Millwall season ticket holder. Sadly he's an arthritis sufferer who is still recovering from a recent fall which resulted in a broken collar bone. Steve did so much for race walking, including being organiser of many events in a long-established series of 9 Kilometres yacht handicap walks (Sundays and Wednesdays), and an annual wonderful "Festival of Walking" all at hilly Blackheath Park in SE3 - plus of course many Post Office events which brought so many newcomers into race walking. He was an official when over 50 raced 5 miles in an evening event filmed by BBC Breakfast Time television which featured an appearance by presenter Mike Bushell, who'd been well trained by former International Carl Lawton -Steve was a marshal on that corner of Battersea Park where there's a pub, so enabling him to do his duty with pint in hand. We all recall Steve's meritorious contribution and wish him well as he recovers from his recent fall.

We are a competitive athletic event not like walking down to do shopping! Perhaps someone could enlighten me?

<u>Adds Hon Ed</u>: All athletes start somewhere. An example is Howard Timms whose rise from beginner to 50k Olympian (his only International selection) was phenomenal. He described himself as "An Accidental Olympian". We hope Development Walks unearth talent, as UK race walking now needs "Gambler's Last Throw" initiatives.

MICK BARNBROOK RIP: FURTHER TRIBUTE

Rest in Peace Mick. A valued competitor who did so much for Guernsey in the early 2000s. Competing with a small number of walkers in his first Church to Church walk in Guernsey in 2001 he set out to promote the event in the UK which resulted in larger number of competing walkers and spectators for that event and the Guernsey 3 kms road walk a few days earlier. He even competed for a few years as a member of Sarnia Walking Club.

MEMORY LANE

I thought you would be interested to hear fully of my experience whilst out training in Winnington Road, Highgate in November, 1971. It was a crisp cold day when a Rolls Royce glided past me and then suddenly stopped. Out of the back stepped a very familiar sportsman, World Heavyweight Boxing Champion Muhammad Ali. He came straight across to me, shook my hand and asked me if I recognised him? Of course I did, being a Boxing fan, but could I believe what I was seeing? He was very interested in what I was training for. I told him my aim was the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich in the 20 Kms Walk. We chatted for some minutes before he proceeded to follow me in his luxury car through the familiar back streets of the Highgate extension. On Boxing Day 1971 he fought and beat Jurgen Blin but, prior to the start of the fight, Harry Carpenter (the famous Boxing commentator) mentioned he was not around as he was out warming up doing an unusual way of road walking. From then on I became a real fan of his, attending and watching many of his fights on the Big Screen particularly when he fought George Foreman and Joe Frazier. I would often see his Fan Manager Paddy Monaghan at Leicester Square Theatre when he was fighting Joe Frazier and went with Mike Hinton, also Highgate, to the Rainbow Theatre, Finsbury Park for the epic fight against George Foreman. On one occasion the Fan Manager told me he had recently returned from Ottawa, Canada where he had been on a promotional tour with Ali. He said on a quiet afternoon in his hotel room they were chatting about his experiences in Highgate London and particularly mentioned "the occasion he met Bill Sutherland out Race Walking training". As a result, I wrote to World Sports Magazine and was awarded a Special Tie for my article entitled 'The Professional with the Amateur touch.' To this day it was such an unforgettable and a memorable experience. Bill Sutherland

Learn something every day! Apparently for the Gloucester 100 in August it was his idea to have runners in lanes 1 and 2, walkers in lanes 3 and 4! If that had been the case at Colchester (1985 24 hr race, 100mls, 100k track races at same time) I reckon my record would have been a bit quicker - for the amount of time I spent overtaking in the second and third lanes! Another shared experience was the Tour du Var, a great stage race where we got invited courtesy of Colin Young. Fantastic!!
